

LETTER FROM OUR PRINCIPAL



It has been almost 40 years now, but my life has come full circle. As a 1980 graduate of DePauw University, I began my teaching career as a junior high science teacher in the room that is now used for art at the Schlarman Academy South Campus. I prefer to think that I was a very mature 22 year old at the time, but now, with a few years of experience and life lessons under my belt I realize I was just a naive kid. However, after all these years the one fact that remains is that I still enjoy being around kids. A daily dose of laughter from a child makes my day.

Maybe I should start by introducing myself. My name is Mark Janesky, and I am a lifelong resident of Vermilion County. My wife and my son are both graduates of Schlarman. I have been a public school principal

for 19 years, a school superintendent for 8 years, an Assistant Regional Superintendent of Schools for Vermilion County for 6½ years, and a past business owner. My wife is Molly Morrissey Janesky, a 1976 graduate of Schlarman High School. I have four children, a son Kyle, a 2000 graduate of Schlarman High School, and 3 girls Erin, Kerry, and Christine. I am also a grandfather to 10 kids: two in Catlin, five in Danville, two in Urbana, and one in Cayce, South Carolina. Four of my grandchildren presently attend Schlarman Academy.

Earlier this year, I decided to make some changes in my life. Certainly returning to Schlarman was a consideration. While not a graduate myself, having taught there even if briefly, knowing the extent of my wife's family commitment to it, and seeing the positive impact the school had on my son, I know the value Schlarman has in our community. As luck would have it, I was offered an opportunity to join the Schlarman family this past summer. While becoming the principal was not at all part of the plan, here I am.

Although the task before me is overwhelming at times, there are many positives. The Schlarman community is truly that - a community. The staff at Schlarman Academy is wonderful. They are devoted, hard working, and perhaps most importantly, caring. Also, being with kids again daily has been wonderful and I enjoy being with each of them every day.

However, there are challenges to overcome. The buildings spring a leak somewhere almost weekly, the foundation of the mansion is beginning to crumble, the roofs need some attention, and the boilers, although working right now (knock on wood), are old and in need of maintenance.

Many of the upcoming projects or needs are going to require some funding that is not presently available. We have been fortunate to secure the funding for the repair of the main floor bathroom, the replacement of the window well at the front of the high school, a portion of the plumbing repairs at the grade school, and the repair of the gutters at both buildings. However, we still have some projects in need of funding if we are going to get them taken care of. *

Throughout the years, the one thing that hasn't changed at Schlarman is the quality of the student that attends and that is a direct reflection on the families, staff, and alumni that support our endeavor. We have great kids and a wonderful staff here at Schlarman Academy and it is a privilege to work with them daily. I only hope I can lead with some gained knowledge since that 22-year-old boy that first started his career here in 1980. We need to continue to provide a solid education in a Christian environment and to grow together as a community while doing so.

Lastly, I would like to thank our alumni and supporters for their past and continued support. Without you, we could not provide the services we do for our students.

CATHOLIC SCHOOLS MATTER

A recent blog <u>1964</u>, sponsored by the Center for Applied Research in the Apostolate, republished an article from June 13, 2014, entitled "Do Catholic Schools Matter?"

The article is quite clear about many of the obvious benefits of Catholic education. Strong academics have been characteristic of Catholic schools since their beginning, but parents indicate their predominant reasons for choosing Catholic schools include "quality religious education" followed by a safe environment.

While such benefits cannot be quantified, price soon becomes the overriding concern for those who feel the recent pinch of an often-lagging economy and rising tuition costs. Therefore, another way to assess the value of a Catholic education is to consider those who are active Catholics in their adult lives.

Many ask the question, "Do Catholic school graduates attend Mass regularly? In general, one can say that post-Vatican II and Millennial Catholics, without attendance at a primary/secondary Catholic school, attend mass regularly at 5% or below.

Those who attend Catholic schools are more likely to experience all of the Catholic milestones: baptism, confirmation, full participation in the Eucharist. Those who attend Catholic schools are also very likely to consider the vocation of the religious life; without Catholic schools, the Catholic church will be challenged to foster those priests and religious to carry the church on in the future. The church's future and its robust existence is guided by those who have attended Catholic schools.

The Catholic church of the future may find itself alongside many Protestant denominations – "Methodist, Episcopalian, or Presbyterian" – where attendance has fallen to abysmal lows. If the diminished Catholic population dips any lower, it will begin a never-ending cycle which would require fewer and fewer of the sacraments and a decreasing number of religious practitioners until the church will be unable to offer religious education at any Catholic school or in any Catholic parish. The obvious point of the article, still relevant in 2018 is this:



Aubrey Myers, 37, is beginning her 12th year of teaching and her fifth year at Schlarman Academy where she has taught seventh, eighth, and ninth grades for the last four years. Myers said she went into teaching with the goal of helping students love school.

"I didn't always love going to school but felt it was important," she said. "I may not have liked going, but there were certain teachers that I loved

and felt loved in their classrooms.

"I wanted to do the same," she said. "I try very hard to make my classroom a home away from home for my kids. I want them to feel loved, to feel important, and to feel comfortable in my classes."

Myers said her "absolute favorite part" of teaching is the "relationships I form with my students."

"They are the reason I am here," she said. "I love hearing my students' ideas, their thoughts and their feelings. I learn from them every day."

As a mother of a middle school student, Myers said she knows firsthand how difficult it is to balance school work and daily life so that children succeed.

"I think the most helpful advice I have (for parents) is to give their children responsibility for themselves at school," she said. "Parents should not be doing their projects, making excuses or getting them organized.

"We need to be preparing them for the future," she said. "If they fail, there has to be consequences, but that is part of learning how to do it for themselves."

Myers said in the future she hopes to continue teaching at Schlarman Academy.

"I want to continue to watch my students grow, watch them succeed here and then see where they go in life and what all of them accomplish," she said.

"As for myself, I hope to ever evolve what I am doing to keep education interesting and my classroom their home away from home," she said.
