

LETTER FROM THE PRINCIPAL



This was one of the most unusual years ever on record! While others were either not in session or were fully remote we tried hard to make the school year as normal as possible. There were, however, some things missing...like athletics for two thirds of the year, dances, and other special events. And I know that a lot of what we had to do to be compliant and still stay in session was not popular with many parents and students. But, we got through it! Are we better for it? Only time will tell! I am not totally sure about how emotionally ready we were for what transpired over the past year. Nor am I totally sure about how we may handle the next year or two. What I am sure about is that after participating in remote learning with all of our students for about six weeks this year, there is no substitution for in-person instruction. Our teachers deserve numerous red apples for their job this year during the remote learning phase we were forced to endure.

With all of that behind us, it is time to discuss about what may lie ahead of us. This summer we are looking at doing some numerous school improvements. We will be roofing part of the grade school and the high school this summer. We will be fixing the window well in the back of the high school and laying new carpet in the upstairs wing of the grade school building. There is also a plan to finish the floor stripping in each building and to do some painting inside and out of each building. We will begin a project involving the creation of a Strategic Plan for the future of the school. That work will begin in June.

Enrollment is up a little bit this past year despite COVID restrictions. We had to limit our classrooms to a certain number of students per room and that did force us to have to turn a few kids away, but our numbers still remain very steady. The enrollment this past year was at 370-375 throughout the year. Our objective is to reach 400.

We had three staff members leave us after many years of service last year. John Henkelman left in August after several years at Schlarman Academy and was replaced by a young man named Kristopher Andrew who came to us from Lexington, Kentucky. Pat Prall retired after 44 years of teaching and Mark Croy took over her work in the Religion department. And Pat Stitt retired last year after 50 years of service to Schlarman. Kerry Showers took over the duties of Mrs. Stitt. This year, Anne Sacheli is retiring after a number of years as a Spanish and Religion instructor and Ann Ruskin, 2nd grade teacher, will retire after 43 years of teaching. All of these people will be missed dearly!

On that same note, there will be a few structural changes to the administration next year as well. I will be stepping aside as the Principal and will be replaced by Katie Coulter. Katie is not only very competent, but she is kind, caring, and maybe the most organized person I have ever met. She has been here the past two years as my assistant and was here as a guidance director for a couple of years prior. She will continue to do the guidance while being the Principal. The alumni, staff, parents, and students will find her to be easy and delightful to work with. I will continue to be around, but my duties will be restricted to finances and building needs. Mark Croy will also continue as the Director of Student Services at the north campus and Barb Rew will assume many of the day-to-day administrative duties at the south

After I retired in 2018 I was asked to step up and assume the role of Principal in September of that year and it has been a pleasurable experience. The families here are great, the staff is wonderful, and the students are a pleasure to work with. I cannot say enough about the support I have received the past three years and thank you all for making my experience at Schlarman Academy enjoyable.

Vicki was a dedicated donor who gave memorial donations each year to the school in her parents' names. Her brother, Terry Vogel, wrote this about Vicki's gift: "I know firsthand how near and dear to her heart was our alma mater, Schlarman High School. I know that it was Vicki's earnest desire that its doors never close, to the glory of God, even to the day of Christ's return." Below is a brief writing of Vicki's life story by Terry Vogel. The Schlarman Foundation and Schlarman Academy are grateful for this generous life gift from Vicki, she made a difference in life as well as death, clearly hers was a life well lived.



Vicki Anne Vogel - Her Life Speaks

My sister, Vicki Anne, was born November 8, 1943, in central Illinois. It was the last stage of World War II and our dad, Leon, was working as a printer and our mother, Norma, was a stay-at -home mom. Since we were only 18 months apart, we shared playtime and friends and even the same classrooms over the years. Our cousin, Karen, stayed with us in summers and we formed a gang of neighborhood kids with Vicki as the leader, of course. The post war years in Danville, Illinois were an idyllic time with community events and parish happenings. Our church, St. Patrick's, always entered a Living Nativity float in the Christmas parades and somehow Vicki was a natural choice, all decked out in her robe to play the part of Mother Mary. In our home, her role playing continued on as she would dress up exactly like the nuns and teach her "classroom"

of stuffed dolls with much emphatic emphasis on discipline and not talking back. Needless to say, my friends and I would run out the back door when she started setting up her imaginary classroom. She was an ongoing "A" student and at Schlarman High School was a cheerleader, class president, prom queen, and co-valedictorian of her class. She always tried to be obliging to me, her big brother, and would end up riding my bike home for me (uphill!) after baseball games...or finish my homework for me...or loan me money for my car. She was a competitive swimmer and an accomplished horseback rider, winning state fair competitions in the quarter horse equestrian class on her horse, Pip. Our friendship deepened at the University of Illinois where we both were students. She graduated Phi Beta Kappa with a teaching degree in social studies. Although we were able to share holidays and special occasions after graduation, her path took her to new locales, teaching/counseling at Indiana State University, then to postgraduate study at San Francisco State University, Oxford University in England, and earning her Master's Degree at the U. of I. My wife. Joan, and I moved to southern California with our sons and at the same time Vicki began a management career with General Telephone at its Simi Valley California office. We rejoiced that the Vogel family was within driving distance of each other again! Although Vicki loved traveling with mom throughout the U.S. and Europe, the joy of her life was being an indulgent aunt to her four nephews. She dyed and hid eggs at Easter, bought them their hearts' desires at Christmas and birthdays, prayed for them, laughed at their corny jokes, raced them down the ski slopes, counseled them on etiquette, dating, and colleges and taught them the fine art of spitting off Ferris wheels. In her later life she moved to Coppell, TX to finish her career. Following early retirement in 1999, St. Ann became the center and anchor of her life and she poured her time and energy into parish activities, serving in its many ministries. Her sisters in Christ were close to her heart as they shared every rich goodness of life and Vicki was most grateful for their help in times of need, as was her family. Vicki's most notable and endearing personality trait was her infectious giggle. It wasn't a laugh but a giggle that would start and roll on until a whole roomful of others would be giggling also. She couldn't help herself. It was

abundant joy overflowing from her humble and gracious heart. We all say that's one of the things we will miss and we thank God that she was ours for these years. She will be remembered for her love and humility and faithful service.

She passed the morning of her birthday before her party even began...yet we are all comforted to know that she was meant to celebrate with the Lord. On that special day, Vicki Anne was welcomed into the glorious and loving presence of her Lord and Savior Jesus Christ and greeted by his eternal words, "Well done, good and faithful servant."

It is very difficult to find an unhappy Dominican and I try to keep that same spirit with me in America.

It has been a long journey from a second-grader in Santo Domingo to a seventh-grader in Danville but I have learned to be who I am no matter where I live in the world.



Remembering Mrs. Judy Turner...

With deep sadness and equally deep appreciation, I write this "goodbye" to Judy Turner who just passed away. Judy Turner taught many thousands of young people for over 50 years at Schlarman High School, Oakwood High School and Danville Area Community College in Dual Enrollment classes.

Our four daughters were taught by Judy while at Schlarman and I benefitted from her astute command of thought process and written words when I worked there and wrote articles for the annual newsletter The View from the Hill. That newsletter didn't leave for the printer's domain

until after passing inspection, and sometimes correction(s), from Judy Turner! We were blessed to have her expertise to critique it to be the best it could be.

As I mentioned, Judy also taught for years at DACC for their Dual Enrollment classes for high school students. Several years ago she was recognized and honored for her efforts in that capacity.

Beyond their high school years, I know Judy stayed in touch with former students who continued to reach out to her for advice on their writing assignments in college. Even before they entered college, she made herself available to help them in their scholarship and entrance essays. At Schlarman reunion times she often met for dinner with many former students to reconnect and reminisce, catching up on their lives and future hopes.

Friend Mary Wicoff recounts a trip during which she accompanied Judy and students. Judy also shared her love of musicals, theater, and travel with the young people. She took students on European tours, including a "theater tour" to London, where the teens acted out parts at the rebuilt Globe Theater and learned behind -the-scenes tricks. Such first-hand experiences made an impression on the students. For example, during a trip to Scotland, they visited a café where J.K. Rowling wrote the first of her "Harry Potter" novels. Judy had a knack for bringing classroom lessons to life for the teens – and relatable to their own lives.

Judy shared her vast expertise and talents of thinking, writing, and grammar rules, with many, including by reading essays for SAT tests for years. I am personally grateful that I had the pleasure of knowing Judy and counting her as a friend.

Thank you, Judy Turner, for touching so many of our lives so positively. Your memory lives on in us.

to those who lost loved ones on that day. The upheaval of those events sent the world and my little section of it on a rollercoaster ride. Fast-forward 20 years and 4 airlines later to where I am now, a captain at Southwest Airlines. Life won't always be easy. It is how you deal with adversity that determines your fate. Find a way, work harder!

I have heard being an airline pilot described in several ways. The one that seems most accurate to me is the one that says it's a day filled with hours of boredom followed by a few minutes of excitement. Excitement comes in several forms: weather, sights and destinations; the challenge of going from takeoff at 160 mph, cruising along at 600mph, and landing around 150 mph. Blizzards, hurricanes, thunderstorms, sandstorms and mechanical issues are some of the challenges of the job. You can start your day in the cold and snow of Chicago and be relaxing on the beaches of the Hawaiian Islands half a day later. So yes, my job is pretty awesome!

I thought I might share one funny story from the early days of my career. I was a brand new captain flying along when my co-pilot, Nick, says to me, "Do you smell that?" I had my vent closed so I opened it up and I could smell it. A faint acrid smell. I said it smells a little like formaldehyde. Nick, being from the United Kingdom, had no idea what I was talking about. I tried to explain to him back in high school we dissected pigs and frogs in Mr. Taylor's Biology class. They preserved those specimens in this fluid called formaldehyde. The conversation lasted around 5 minutes where we agreed with Winston Churchill's famous statement that we were indeed two people separated by a common language. Our conversation was interrupted by a call from the flight attendant. Nick answers the phone and the flight attendant tells him smoke is pouring in from the vents. He passes the message to me and I tell her to investigate for the source. As they are talking on the phone, it becomes very obvious where our smoke was coming from. All of our warnings lights on the overhead panel for the left engine came on. I looked over my shoulder out the window to see flames coming out of the front of the motor. I tap Nick on the shoulder to get his attention to help with resolving our challenge for the day. We ran our procedures, essentially blew out the fire and landed in Chicago without incident. As with any abnormal occurrence, we looked back at the event to see what we did right versus what we could have done better. When it was all said and done, we burned and melted some carbon fiber, the source of our smell, smoke and flames. When Nick and I filled out our official report of what had happened, we thought it would probably be best to leave out the part where we discussed my high school Biology class.

Throughout my life, events that I have encountered have been made easier to handle by the foundation I received here at Schlarman. Not just my academics and sports, but my faith was also established and strengthened here at Schlarman. I learned about self-discipline, being a leader and being humble. Own up to your mistakes. I taught many of you a short course when you were in 5th grade and I went around the room and asked what you wanted to be when you grew up. The responses were wide ranging from pro ball players and actors to doctors, nurses, bakers and engineers. Do you remember those dreams you had? What are you doing today and tomorrow and the next day to make those dreams become reality? Find a way, work harder!

Look back on your time here at Schlarman as your first steps in life, establishing a strong foundation. It is the beginning of your life's journey. It's not the end of the story but just the first chapter in an epic adventure. I wish you nothing but success in the years to come. No matter if you are planning on joining the military, entering the workforce immediately or heading off to school, remember these years fondly.






