Mrs. Rew provided academic support to students at the South Campus to help them reach their potential in math and reading. A LETTER FROM OUR ADVANCEMENT DIRECTOR



As I write this letter the Illinois General Assembly spring session has ended and the proposed removal of the sunset on the Invest in Kids Act (Tax Credit Scholarships) did not come up for a vote. In 2017, bipartisan lawmakers passed the Invest in Kids Act. This historic law-the first of its kind in Illinois- transforms lives by providing scholarships annually for kids from low-income and working-class families in Illinois. Scholarships are funded through private donations to scholarship granting organizations, like Empower Illinois, who then administer the application and scholarship process. Donations to the scholarship program are eligible for a 75% state tax credit. The legislative session was supposed to include a vote to extend the program indefinitely, beyond its initial 6 year life. Now we have to wait until the fall to see if the program will be extended.

How it works:

Students apply- Low income and working class families within 300% of the Federal Poverty level apply for a scholarship to a private K-12 school of their choice.

Donors Give-Individuals and corporate donors make contributions to scholarship granting organizations who then fund scholarships. In turn, donors receive a 75% state tax credit.

Scholarships Awarded, lives changed- Scholarships are awarded to families who meet the income requirements, based on available funds at the school of their choice.

Over the last five years of the program donors to Schlarman Academy have given \$950,000.00 to support students at Schlarman through the Invest in Kids program. For the 22/23 school year \$220,000.00 was donated and 62 students received scholarships. Another 45 students had applied and were eligible for funding but there weren't enough funds to provide them scholarships. Currently we have 110 students who are eligible for scholarships for the 23/24 school year and in order to provide all of them funding we need to raise \$424,000.00 in Invest in Kids funds before November 30, 2023.

It is of the utmost importance that this program continues for our students and families beyond the upcoming school year, the fact that over 100 of our students qualify for these scholarships makes it obvious that the program needs to continue.

How you can help:

Illinois Residents-Please contact your legislator to tell them you support removing the sunset on the Tax Credit Scholarship program. If you are interested in donating to the program please contact the Advancement Office at (217) 442-1184, donations for next school year will be accepted until November 30, 2023.






















CLASS OF 2023 COMMENCEMENT ADDRESS


















BLURTON & WATSON EARN DUAL GRADUATE HONORS

A LETTER FROM OUR CHAPLAIN



As the new Chaplain, I was inspired to learn about Bishop Schlarman. Every institution has heroes and needs new heroes. Archbishop Joseph Henry Leo Schlarman opened Schlarman Academy in the 1950's. Joseph was raised on a simple farm with a large Catholic family. He attended college in Quincy, IL. As a seminarian he studied in Austria where he was later ordained. He then moved to Rome to study canon law. As a priest and bishop, he was committed to helping farmers. He wrote a book on early French explorers and settlers in the Americas and made regular visits to a seminary in Mexico to assist in priestly formation. Prison reform was also a special interest of his. He visited prisons around the world and for several years he served on the Illinois State Prison commission. He was loved by his priests and often preached on the importance of strong marriages and families.

I have been a priest for 20 years with several assignments from Champaign to Rock Island. I grew up in Fowler, IN with my five sisters and two brothers. I have a twin sister who is married to a Naval officer, and together they travel the world on various assignments with their five children. I enjoy visiting my dad who lives on our 5th generation family farm in Indiana. After high school I went to Purdue, St. Louis University, Mount St Mary's, and the University of Notre Dame where I obtained my Masters of Business Administration in 2020. Like most priests today, I have had the opportunity to travel and it has expanded my understanding of various cultures and the global church. I pray that my experience and education can be of service to our academy. My main goal is the spiritual development of the students and faculty. I will do my best to promote a devotion to the Eucharist and Our Blessed Mother. I would like to see more students, teachers and parents receiving the Sacraments. Everyone will study Catholic theology and the sacraments here at Schlarman. There are many good Catholic sources that are accessible online, such as Our Sunday Visitor, that allow us to study and pray on the go.

In the Sacrament of Baptism original sin is washed away. We are marked as a member of the church and we enjoy a new life in Christ. In Confession God is generous with his mercy: we strive anew to live a better moral life. During Mass we are then nourished with the Body and Blood of Christ. When Confirmed, the soul receives the outpouring of the Holy Spirit. Most graduates will go on to get married. At Holy Matrimony, husband and wife exchange vows and become one body. May they be blessed with many children and grandchildren. These sacraments are our treasures: the greatest things the Church can offer. At Archbishop Schlarman Academy, we must cherish these treasures with true devotion! Please pray for me as I start this new assignment as chaplain. I look forward to talking with you in person and sharing the faith with you on social media platforms.



People have asked, "So why did you go to Schlarman, anyway?" Good question. I had attended only public

schools, first in Danville, then in Westville. But as freshman year approached, I set my sights higher. Schlarman was college-prep. I admired the serene and beautiful campus, up on North Vermilion Street. I was Catholic, after all, and St. Mary's School provided bus rides from Westville and back.

I arrived in August 1968. I was a friendless alien, so to speak. We screamed ourselves silly at football and basketball games. Topper Nation? Absolutely! Thanks to selfless administrators, lay teachers, priests and nuns, we left Schlarman prepared for the challenges and trials ahead.

The Class of 1972 held its 50-year reunion last fall. Love was all around ... for classmates, of course, but also for the school that had brought us together, and shaped us, in such important ways. Schlarman is a special place, a light on a hilltop. Always has been, and always will be. To borrow a quote from Proverbs: "Her children rise up and call her blessed."
